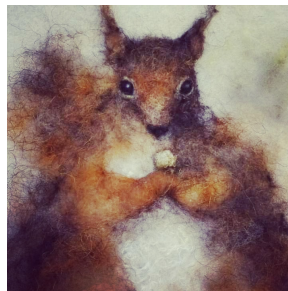


National Red Squirrel Awareness Week 2020

Annual newsletter

Usually the annual hard copy newsletter comes out this month but, as with many things this year, there are changes. The next hard copy will be out in the spring of 2021 so that a whole year of data is shared, instead of roughly July—June, as in the past. A monthly bulletin will continue until at least 2021.

Road casualties

There are always at least two peaks in road casualties each year, usually when young are dispersing in spring and autumn. Blackspots are the main Newport to Ryde road, Wilmingham Lane, Halletts Shute, the Ryde to Brading road and Shalfleet to Yarmouth main road. Please be especially careful driving in these areas and please report squirrel casualties you see.

Data collection

I'm trying to streamline data collection from citizen scientists. There is also an app and online form but these take a bit of work to input into a main spreadsheet. Most people can input via Excel easily enough, so if you can use Excel, please do. Then just email the file to me at wightsquirrels@hotmail.com. These are the headings—

Monitoring is THE most important aspect of red squirrel work, so please keep the Citizen Science coming.

Hairtube surveys to collect hair for DNA analysis are planned for 2021. These results will fill in the gaps from the previous two studies. The second genetic paper is finished but not published yet. Tests for adenovirus and squirrelpox have been undertaken as well and this should be published soon.

Camera traps are commonly used elsewhere in the UK, so the Wight Squirrel Project will purchase cameras, again for next year. I will have to work out an Isle of Wight strategy for monitoring between now and then. The bi-annual walks are still undertaken by the most loyal and dedicated volunteers.
